Since then she has been handling children of various primary grades. Priyanka handles English, EVS as well as life skills at the primary level. She is blessed with an infant son and her refreshing smile brings a good start to the day.

1. What drew you to teaching as a career after pursuing commerce?

As a young girl, I always dreamt of becoming a teacher because my teachers were able to make learning so much fun. But as I got older I wanted to explore more possibilities and thus took up commerce and started studying for being a Chartered Accountant and that's when I realised that C.A was not my true calling and that my heart was in teaching. I am grateful for the turn of events that lead me to become a teacher and thus share with others the desire to learn, strive for excellence and explore possibilities that my teachers had fostered within me.

2. What skills do you think one requires for teaching such young children?

An effective teacher can have a huge impact on pupil's life, but to leave a lasting impression and deal with the daily challenges of managing a classroom, teachers need a mix of soft and specific skills.

Strong subject knowledge - One of the most important skills is to have strong subject knowledge and the ability to keep oneself updated about the various advances in their fields.

Strong communication skills – It is important for teachers to remember to use encouraging language while communicating to pupil and breaking down of topic into simpler language that would cater to all the children and for the better understanding of the class.

Ability to build a strong relationship - It is important to treat each learner in a class as though they are significant. This is more likely to lead to pupils being more engaged and honest about what they know or do not know and that can lead to them sharing ideas and asking questions for a better teaching learning experience

Last but not the least **Good sense of Humour** – It is not necessarily a skill, but humour is really useful to teachers too. I believe happy students are more open to learning.

3. How would you describe children of this age? Do you think there is a huge difference in the coming generation than those before them?



2. What brought on an inclination towards teaching?




MATH QUIZ

Secondary Parent Wworkshop

On Saturday, 21st July 2018, The Somaiya School held a workshop for parents of the secondary section (grades 6-10) students. The workshop was conducted by Dr. Pallavi Bhurkay, a clinical psychologist, psychotherapist and hypnotherapist. The topic of the workshop was "Managing Adolescent Behaviour." More than 250 parents attended the workshop.

The workshop covered topics related to changes in adolescent age in terms of physical, emotional and mental changes. This workshop helped parents get an idea of how certain parenting styles affect the child in the adolescence age. The speaker also spoke about the boundaries that should be set when giving freedom to the child. The speaker shared her own experiences of how she dealt with her own adolescent child. She also shared the importance of giving respect to the child's wish and at the same time help the child think analytically about the same. She explained the importance of NEED and WANT that should be explained to the childrens and followed by parents too. She explained about importance of open communication with children in the adolescent age. She explained that children need to be taught conflict management in this age. The parents should take a back seat when it comes to conflict resolution. With a discussion method the children can be made aware of their own feelings and that of others too and the way to resolve conflict. Thus the importance of building frustration tolerance, ways to resolve conflict was taught through this workshop.

Overall the parents found the workshop very informative and have asked for such workshops to be conducted every 6 months.
