

How has the transition been, moving from a corporate to a school environment?

I worked as a stenographer with The Union Bank of India for 11 years. The criterion for the position was to be good at shorthand. This criterion has helped me immensely to get me back into the professional arena in 2007. I joined the Billabong High School, Thane and then later joined TSS as Personal Assistant to the Principal in May 2013.

How would you describe this journey and progress of the school?

I have been with the school since its inception of the primary section. We did not even have our own fully functional building. We started with just 110 students and today we have over 1165 students. In these five years, the school has earned a very good name and has become very popular. We have such good events and activities that it makes me feel very happy. What I feel now seeing the school today, words cannot do justice to my feelings. There is a sense of pride and happiness in seeing the school grow.

How has your role progressed along with the growth of the school?

When I joined in 2013, my initial responsibility was taking care of inventory and stock. As the school grew and the staff increased, my role and responsibilities got extended. I coordinate with the education department, the CBSE board etc. for the required administrative permissions. Under the guidance of both, the former Principal and the current Principal, I also look into the back ground preparation for staff recruitment. I am also the one point contact for parents and coordinate with them for various activities of the school.

How has the five years in the school been?

Every day is a new learning. Professionally I have grown a lot. Coordinating with various educational agencies has been a tremendous learning experience. Hence I see that there are more dimensions to my role as Personal Assistant to the Principal. And I am happy to be in this space of growth and development.

How do you see yourself amidst the current younger generation?

Today's young generation is very hard working. They understand their roles and responsibilities quite well. In such a highly competitive environment, they hold themselves up very well. They know what they need to do. I think we need to learn that from them.

Do you think you need to change certain attitudes with respect to the current environment?

Personally, I think I need to be a good listener. And I think that I am becoming one!!

How did you get into the Art line?

I got into this field quite by accident. Though my drawing has always been good, I did my Bachelors in Economics. After my graduation, seeing my drawing proficiency, I was encouraged to apply for the Art teacher's Diploma. After completing that I achieved my Art Master's certificate then, I entered the field of animation in a corporate environment.

What brought on a shift from corporate to education?

I used to conduct workshops on the making of Eco-friendly Ganesha for a social cause. I conducted one such workshop for the pre-primary in 2012. With that began my association with the school.

What is your opinion about Art in schools?

Personally, I think we can do a lot more than what we are doing today. We can actually provide the base and background for children to pursue creative professions in the future such as Architecture, Design, Advertising etc. We need an Art revolution schools.

How would you compare working in the corporate world to working in the school?

Working in the corporate environment means meeting targets and following the dictates of your boss. Working with children is more satisfying. There can be so much of experimentation and exploration in the art domain with them. And the progress made through these experiments is visible in their growth and development. In the school, we have brought in live experiences through Little Picasso, Art Mela, live models for paintings etc. This has been an enriching experience for both, them as well as me. The appreciation of the parents, the encouragement and support of the Principal and the Management has been a big boost for me.

What would you like to do for Art in schools?

I would like to expose the children to various art forms such as pottery, clay and carpentry. New avenues will open up for the students with such exposure. Art need not be expensive. It is a common complaint from Art teachers that they don't get materials approved because of cost and expenditure. We can use locally available materials for the art classes. Art is not only for joy, but it is also a source of livelihood. People associated with Art need to be more proactive and dynamic if they want to see their efforts bearing fruit.

How has your journey been so far?

Personally, in the last five years, I have learnt and grown a lot. I am a person who lives by my own rules. As is the impression of artists, I am as maverick as can be. With Principal Ma'am having an artistic background, her inputs and ideas have helped me grow a lot. It has given me a lot of confidence and courage to explore and venture out with new media, getting different resource people. I have also explored with new materials such as cardboard etc. The making of the dinosaur for BEAMS, the Brain model, Kala Ghoda installation etc. has been my learning curve.



World Environment Day

World Environment day was celebrated by the students of TSS with commitment and zeal. The day began with an assembly that saw various organisations committed to the cause of environment protection interacting with the students. Behtar India introduced a new campaign for this year with the appropriate stages and criteria.
